

SENATOR MIKE MORRELL (RET) TO KEYNOTE SEPTEMBER MEETING

Senator Mike Morrell is the confirmed speaker for the September 23 General Membership Meeting.

Senator Morrell was born and raised in California. He and his wife, Joanie, have three adult children. For more than 25 years, Sen. Morrell was a small business owner, opening two corporations in the Inland Empire, Provident Home Loans and Provident Realty, both of which incorporated in 1989.

Senator Morrell was first elected to the California Assembly in 2010, representing the 63rd Assembly District. He has represented California's 23rd State Senate District since 2014. Over the course of his time in the legislature, he has served on a number of policy committees, including housing, labor, public safety, and several others.

In his retirement, **Senator Morrell** has been a prolific writer and will be introducing his book "The Road To Restoring The Family: Leaving an Inheritance to Our Children's Children". Very timely given the ongoing attack on traditional American values.

DEMOCRATS AGAINST DEMOCRACY

On Saturday night August 31, in the final hours before the midnight end of the 2023-2024 legislative session, California Democrats offered a master class in antidemocratic governing.

Here are the highlights:

As the final day began, the legislature still had "about 200 bills to sort through." With around 45 minutes to go before midnight and several bills yet to get through, Democrats made the possibly unprecedented decision to limit debate to only 30 seconds per bill, despite massive pushback from Republicans who rightfully argued that these bills were big and impactful and deserved greater consideration than half a minute.

Assembly erupts into "chaos."

For fear their exceedingly rushed legislating might hit a speedbump, Democrats voted to silence **Republican Assemblymember Bill Essayli** on the floor who vociferously objected to Democrats' antidemocratic maneuvers.

The bad news is, we are required by state law (Elections Code 2227) to receive an affirmative response from the voter that they have moved or no longer wish to be registered to vote in our County BEFORE we can remove them. We can send a post card to the new address, but if they do not confirm their voter status has changed, sign the post card, and mail it back, the state requires that we keep them listed as a registered voter and spend tax dollars mailing ballots to their old address FOREVER!

It would seem to me that if they don't respond to the inquiry, they should be flagged and removed, particularly since a voter can now register to vote as late as Election Day if they had still wished to vote and were mistakenly disenrolled, but those are the rules the state has mandated for all 58 counties.

District 1Supervisor Kevin Jeffries Voter Validation - A group of civicminded residents has been attending our Board meetings, expressing concerns about the election processes, and the accuracy of voter rolls, and the apparently high numbers of voters who appear to have moved or died that still show up as registered voters. This is particularly important now, since the COVID-era state law changes require every registered voter to receive a ballot by mail.

In response to these concerns, the Registrar of Voters hired a credit reporting agency to review our entire list of voters to identify those who have moved or may be deceased. That agency identified 123,541 individuals who MAY have moved, and almost another 150,000 out of 1.34 million voter file records whose addresses "couldn't be validated". Good news, right?

Well - partially. Some of these people may only be temporarily out of the county (temp job, military, college, etc), so we have to verify each voter independently, but this list does give us a good starting point.

9/11 DO NOT FORGET

Where were you and what were you doing at 8:45 a.m. on September 11, 2001? With the world as it is today, one may need reminded of the 9/11 tragedy.

On September 11, 2001, 19 militants associated with the Islamic extremist group al-Qaeda hijacked four airplanes and carried out suicide attacks against targets in the United States. Almost 3,000 people were killed during the 9/11 terrorist attacks, which triggered major U.S. initiatives to combat terrorism and defined the presidency of George W. Bush.

At 8:45 a.m. on a clear Tuesday morning, an American Airlines Boeing 767 loaded with 20,000 gallons of jet fuel crashed into the north tower of the World Trade Center.

As the evacuation of the tower and its twin got underway, television cameras broadcasted live images of what initially appeared to be a freak accident. Then, 18 minutes after the first plane hit, a second appeared out of the sky and sliced into the south tower. The U.S. was under attack.

As millions watched the events unfolding in New York, American Airlines Flight 77 circled over downtown Washington, DC before crashing into the west side of the Pentagon military headquarters at 9:45 a.m. Jet fuel from the Boeing 757 caused a devastating inferno that led to the structural collapse of a portion of the giant concrete building, headquarters of the Department of Defense.

A fourth California-bound plane was hijacked about 40 minutes after leaving an airport in New Jersey. Because the plane had been delayed, passengers on board learned of events in New York and Washington via cell phone and airfone calls to the ground. Knowing that the aircraft was not returning to an airport as the hijackers claimed, a group of passengers and flight attendants planned an insurrection.

They fought the four hijackers and are suspected to have attached the cockpit with a fire extinguisher. The plane then flipped and sped toward the ground at upwards of 500 miles per hour crashing in a rural field killing 44 passengers.

Some of the terrorists had lived in the U.S. for more than a year and had taken flying lessons at American commercial flight schools. Others had slipped into the country in the months prior to September 11.

ORIGIN OF LABOR DAY

Union leader Peter J. McGuire is generally given credit for the idea of Labor Day in the United States, but it was likely another leader, Matthew Maguire, who suggested to the Central Labor Union of New York a celebration honoring workers. This resulted in a parade of some 10,000 workers on September 5, 1882.

By 1885 Labor Day celebrations were being held in a number of states, and in 1894 U.S. President Grover Cleveland signed into law a bill making Labor Day a national holiday.
